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A Word from the Pastor

Midweek Lent Series

"The Fruit of the Spirit" Galatians 5:13-26

It is a good old-fashioned Christian discipline to try to worship more often during the holy season of Lent. Please count our 6:30 p.m. Wednesday liturgies among your Lent opportunities.

Our main text for this year's midweek Lent services will be Galatians 5:13-26, where Saint Paul speaks of freedom:

¹³For you were called to freedom, brothers and sisters; only do not use your freedom as an opportunity for selfindulgence, but through love become slaves to one another. (Galatians 5:13, NRSV)

Remarkable phrase there: "slaves to one another." Strange freedom! It involves slavery!

The apostle also casts his theme about freedom in terms of life in the Spirit: "Live by the Spirit, I say, and do not gratify the desires of the flesh." (Galatians 5:16, NRSV)

This call to live in the Spirit leads to Saint Paul's famous list of the "fruit of the Spirit":

... the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, ²³gentleness, and self-control. There is no law against such things. (Galatians 5:22-23, NRSV)

We do not have enough Lent Wednesdays to do all of these fruits of the Spirit, but we can do many of them. Let's focus on the first five. Here, then, is this year's midweek Lent schedule:

"Second Sunday" Evening Worship

Sunday, March 2nd, Transfiguration Sunday Vespers, 5 p.m.

Sunday, March 9th, First Sunday in Lent Lectio Divina, 4 p.m., Vespers, 5 p.m. Led by Rev. Kelly-Ray Meritt

Festival Vespers for the Transfiguration of our Lord will be offered Sunday, March 2nd, at 5:00 p.m. The Transfiguration, anciently celebrated on August 6th, but more recently on the Sunday before the beginning of Lent, is traditionally the "titular feast" (or name day) for congregations named with any of the titles of our Lord, such as Christ, Redeemer, Messiah, or Immanuel. As Pastor Fryer mentioned last Sunday, this will be the first day of Immanuel Lutheran Church's second 150 years.

The ceremony of "burying the Alleluia" will be observed at the end of the service: To remind ourselves that we do not sing the triumphant Alleluia during the season of Lent, a banner bearing the word will be hidden in the baptismal font until the vigil of Easter. (The evangelist Luke is especially clear in proclaiming the Transfiguration, that Moses and Elijah appear to discuss with our Lord "the Exodus he was to accomplish in Jerusalem." Read also the third chapter of Paul's letter to the Colossians to understand the connection between our Baptism and Jesus' death and burial, and how we, too, are transformed in his resurrection.)

The First Sunday in Lent, March 9th, we resume the regular "Second Sunday" schedule with Lectio Divina (a form of group siritual practice) at 4:00 p.m. and Sunday Vespers at 5:00 p.m. You are welcome to participate in all these events.

Shrove Tuesday

Tuesday, March 4, 2014, 5:30 p.m. to 7:30 p.m.

Tuesday, March 4th, is Shrove Tuesday, and Immanuel will hold its annual Pancake and Sausage Supper for fun and fellowship. We like to direct receipts from this annual supper to our Sunday School, especially Vacation Bible School.

The music will start at 6:00 p.m. and go until 7:00 p.m. The doors of the church hall will be open from 5:30 p.m. to 7:30 p.m. Please use the Lexington Avenue entrance. Ash Wednesday

Wednesday, March 5th, 2014 – Liturgies at 12:15 p.m. and 6:30 p.m.



We will have two liturgies again this year – one at 12:15 p.m. and one at 6:30 p.m. Each of these liturgies has its own blessing. The noontime service is a spoken liturgy and is nice because of the presence of neighborhood people who slip away during their lunch hours for our brief liturgy. The evening liturgy is the main traditional parish liturgy with Choir.

The Immanuel Choir is planning special music for our Ash Wednesday service on Wednesday March 5th, at 6:30 pm. The choir will sing William Byrd's complete *Mass for Four Voices*, one of the most famous Renaissance polyphonic mass settings, for this service in the place of our regular congregational mass setting. Byrd's exquisite a cappella mass will provide a serene and meditative aspect to our service, highlighting the beginning of our penitential season of Lent.

Special Voters' Assembly

Our Roof and Steeple Project After the liturgy, Sunday, March 16

The much anticipated time has come: There will be a special Voters' Assembly after church on Sunday, March 16 to authorize our church to enter into a contract to replace the roofing on our church and steeple and to make needed repairs to the masonry of the building. The bid documents for our project were prepared by our project manager, John G. Waite Associates, Architects, and distributed to recommended contractors. The bids we received back are in line with what our cost estimator had predicted. The Roof Committee will review the information with us and recommend that we enter into a contract. With the contract in hand, the contractor will be able to start the process to make required filings and obtain needed permits. Once that process is completed, construction should quickly begin. So, please put this on your calendar as this is an important and long-awaited meeting.

Vespers at Corpus Christi Church

Fr. Daniel O'Reilly, Pastor of Corpus Christi Church, has invited me to preach for this Lent Vespers liturgy. I count it a high honor to preach at any church, but especially at this important church. This is the church where the great spiritual writer Thomas Merton was instructed in the faith of the church and baptized while a graduate student at Columbia University in 1938. Later in life, Merton recalled Corpus Christi with affection:

> The words, songs, ceremonies, signs, movements of worship are all designed to open the mind and heart of the participant to this experience of oneness in Christ. One reason why I am a Catholic, a monk and a priest today is that I first went to Mass, and kept going to Mass, in a Church where these things were realized. . . . There was nothing new or revolutionary about it; only that everything was well done, not out of aestheticism or rubrical obsessiveness, but out of love for God and His truth. It would certainly be ingratitude in me if I did not remember the atmosphere of joy, light, and at least relative openness and spontaneity that filled Corpus Christi at solemn High Mass.

Fr. O'Reilly's theme for this year's Lenten Vespers series is "The Psalms as the Poetry of God." I'd be glad if you could join us then.
