Service of Light

- L Jesus Christ is the Light of the world,
- **G** the light no darkness can overcome.
- L Stay with us, Lord, for it is evening,
- **G** and the day is almost over.
- Let your light scatter the darkness,
- **G** and illumine your Church.

As the hymn is said, the candles on and near the altar are lighted. When the large candle is used, the candles are lighted from its flame.

- L Joyous light of glory:
- of the immortal Father; heavenly, holy, blessed Jesus Christ.
 We have come to the setting of the sun, and we look to the evening light.
 We sing to God, the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit:
 You are worthy of being praised with pure voices forever.
 O Son of God, O Giver of life: The universe proclaims your glory.

The thanksgiving concludes the Service of Light.

Psalmody

The Psalmody begins with this song for forgiveness and protection.

Set a watch before my mouth, O Lord, and guard the door of my lips. Let not my heart incline to any evil thing; let me not be occupied in wickedness with evildoers.

But my eyes are turned to you, Lord God; in you I take refuge. Strip me not of my life.

Glory to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit; as it was in the beginning, is now, and will be forever. Amen.

A second psalm is said. Silence for meditation follows each psalm or canticle.

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PSALM 79, LBW (To be read responsively)

¹O God, the heathen have come into your inheritance;

they have profaned your holy temple;

they have made Jerusalem a heap of rubble.

²They have given the bodies of your servants as food for the birds of the air, and the flesh of your faithful ones to the beasts of the field. ³They have shed their blood like water on every side of Jerusalem, and there was no one to bury them. ⁴We have become a reproach to our neighbors, an object of scorn and derision to those around us. ⁵How long will you be angry, O LORD? Will your fury blaze like fire forever? ⁶Pour out your wrath upon the heathen who have not known you and upon the kingdoms that have not called upon your name. ⁷For they have devoured Jacob and made his dwelling a ruin. ⁸Remember not our past sins; let your compassion be swift to meet us; for we have been brought very low. ⁹Help us, O God our Savior, for the glory of your name; deliver us and forgive us our sins, for your name's sake. ¹⁰Why should the heathen say, "Where is their God?" Let it be known among the heathen and in our sight that you avenge the shedding of your servants' blood. ¹¹Let the sorrowful sighing of the prisoners come before you, and by your great might spare those who are condemned to die. ¹²May the revilings with which they reviled you, O Lord, return sevenfold into their bosoms. ¹³For we are your people and the sheep of your pasture; we will give you thanks forever and show forth your praise from age to age.

PSALM PRAYER

■ Father of mercy, your Son told his enemies that, if they should destroy the temple of his body, you would raise it again in three days. By his death and resurrection demolish our pretensions of strength, and on the ruins build a temple worthy of your name, so that all the world may know the glory of your transforming power, shown in Jesus Christ our Lord. **Amen.**

GOSPEL LESSON FOR THE DAY	John 6:27-4(), RSV
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[Jesus said] ²⁷Do not labor for the food which perishes, but for the food which endures to eternal life, which the Son of man will give to you; for on him has God the Father set his seal." ²⁸Then they said to him, "What must we do, to be doing the works of God?" ²⁹Jesus answered them, "This is the work of God, that you believe in him whom he has sent." ³⁰So they said to him, "Then what sign do you do, that we may see, and believe you? What work do you perform? ³¹Our fathers ate the manna in the wilderness; as it is written, 'He gave them bread from heaven to eat.'" ³²Jesus then said to them, "Truly, truly, I say to you, it was not Moses who gave you the bread from heaven; my Father gives you the true bread from heaven. ³³For the bread of God is that which comes down from heaven, and gives life to the world." ³⁴They said to him, "Lord, give us this bread always."

³⁵Jesus said to them, "I am the bread of life; he who comes to me shall not hunger, and he who believes in me shall never thirst. ³⁶But I said to you that you have seen me and yet do not believe. ³⁷All that the Father gives me will come to me; and him who comes to me I will not cast out. ³⁸For I have come down from heaven, not to do my own will, but the will of him who sent me; ³⁹and this is the will of him who sent me, that I should lose nothing of all that he has given me, but raise it up at the last day. ⁴⁰For this is the will of my Father, that every one who sees the Son and believes in him should have eternal life; and I will raise him up at the last day."

Silence for meditation follows each reading. The leader then continues:

- L In many and various ways God spoke to his people of old by the prophets.
- **G** But now in these last days he has spoken to us by his Son.

GOSPEL CANTICLE (Mary's Magnificat)
