Lutheranism 101

During Coffee Hour, starting Sunday, June 23

ear Members and Friends of Immanuel Lutheran Church, "Lutheranism 101" is our course for prospective *new members*, but everyone is welcome to attend. It is a fun course for Pastor Lara and me to teach because we are proud of the Lutheran tradition and enjoy talking about it.

The heart of the course is Martin Luther's *Small Catechism*. One of my favorite Luther passages is his response to Christians who do not study the catechism. "Many regard the catechism as a simple, trifling teaching, which they can absorb and master at one reading and then toss the book into a corner as if they are ashamed to read it again." But not Luther! He does not consider the catechism to be a simple, trifling teaching. Rather he studies it his whole life long. And so, here is the passage I like so much:

But this I say for myself: I am also a doctor and a preacher, just as learned and experienced as all of them who are so high and mighty. Nevertheless, each morning, and whenever else I have time, I do as a child who is being taught the catechism and I read and recite

word for word the Lord's Prayer, the Ten Commandments, the Creed, the Psalms, etc. I must still read and study the catechism daily, and yet I cannot master it as I wish, but must remain a child and pupil of the catechism—and I also do so gladly. (Luther, *Large Catechism*, Kolb-Wengert Edition)

So, our Lutheranism 101 course gives us a chance to "remain a child and pupil of the catechism."

We begin the course with some historical perspective, aiming to place the Lutheran Reformation in the context of church history. We begin with the Council of Nicaea in 325, linger with Luther, and speed on toward Bach and John Wesley and so on, ending with Immanuel's decision in 2016 to join the North American Lutheran Church (NALC). When we discuss the parts of Luther's catechism concerning Baptism, Holy Communion, and Private Confession, it gives us a chance to talk about the liturgy.

We have many new faces at Immanuel these days. You are all dear to us — both longtime members and newcomers. We hope Lutheranism 101 will help you to consider joining our congregation.

The course usually goes for eight or nine sessions. You might not be able to attend every session, but please come whenever you can. It will be good to be with you, always.

Before his ordination, Dagaga served as an evangelist in a congregation in Ethiopia. Now he is called to the holy ministry at an Oromo mission in Nairobi, Kenya. "Oromo" is one of the language groups of Ethiopia. Dagaga's congregation is mainly a refugee community.

For clergy, it is always a joy to witness an ordination. It means that the Holy Spirit is hard at work raising up a new generation of ministers. It means that there is one more person on earth authorized by God to speak the Gospel in Word and Sacrament. So, the refugees in Nairobi have their pastor now. Carol and Bishop Dan Selbo and Rev. Dr. Gemechis Buba are all happy about it. Here is a photo of Carol and Dagaga and a third person (we do not know his name):



Our congregation has sent benevolence money to support Dagaga's ministry to refugees in Kenya.
